ADJOURNMENT:

The Governing Committee consisting of Kathleen Chvala, Tom Holmes and Christine Wilson met with the President of KVL, Mr. Kyle Harris and Mr. Mark Flemm on May 17, 2022. We discussed two items, a short term lease, good for a year, to have the Davis Field available for this year and a long term lease of five years.

KVL will maintain the inside of the field and the Borough will maintain the outside, unless major repairs are necessary. KVL will have a grounds keeper to maintain the field. Brian Anderson is presently the grounds keeper and Josh Woods is presently cutting grass. KVL maintains the grass year round. There will be no other activities, outside of football, without Borough Council approval.

KVL only uses the Jackson side bleachers and concession stand.

The Borough Recreation Committee, chaired by John Uskuraitis, will take care of the demolition and removal of the dilapidated structure on the Linden side of the field along with trees and trash near the basketball court end of the field.

KVL is going to purchase a new dumpster and is going to change the sign on the bypass side of the field to "Home Of The Kiski Valley Lancers". KVL also needs to replace the scoreboard.

Davis Field is a Historic Site.

Larry advised us that Att'y Kraft is working on a stadium lease agreement.

Tom Holmes brought Chris Cerminare, P.E. to do a Field Inspection of the Davis Field from A.E. Dynamics out of New Kensington on Tuesday, May 24th at a cost of \$1,500.00.

Once I see what Att'y Kraft Proposes, I will choose a committee to continue working with KVL on a five Year contract.

I would like for Council to motion to move ahead with the immediate short term lease at this June meeting.

MARILEE KESSLER—Trees and Lights Report

Agenda Item requests:

Tree removal and stump grinding request for bids has gone out. Trimming list and removal of dead branches list is being developed.

Request received from Pomfrets and Ianni's to place two trees on Farragut Ave in front of these businesses in memory of John Pomfret. All costs will be paid by those making the request.

Prices for 5 trees requested from Jesse Salensky-To replace other trees that had been re moved

Discusion of the possibility to havie the borough apply for available funding to assess and improve the state of our borough trees, including to removal and replacement of the bradford pear trees that are located in our business district and other borough property.

Request to have our tree committee investigate the funding sources and available resources through Penn State Extension, TreeVitalize (DCNR) and with conversations with local communities that have successfully applied for and received funds for both the necessary borough tree inventory and for a significant number of trees and services to appropriately care for this important resource in our community. Consult with other sources as we see that they are available. My hope is that we will be able to restore the once beautiful streetscape to our community.

Two trees that were requested for removal were assessed & determined to not need removal—Trees are not "dead" or dangerous

Not trees/lights, but regarding blight and the redevelopment authority:

Update: The inventory of all structures in Vandergrift is progressing nicely. Request for the identification of more potential buildings that can benefit from ARPA funding has been received and a list was sent to the Redevelopment Authority/Land Bank.

AGENDA ITEM FOR JUNE COUNCIL MEETING

Daisha Clayton, Marilee Kessler, and Jody Sarno, who have been attending the Alle-Kiski Intergovernmental Council meetings for the last few months, respectfully request that consideration be given to Vandergrift joining that body.

A short presentation of approximately 10-15 minutes for representatives of the Westmoreland County Planning Commission has been offered to explain the benefits to each community because of this cooperation. We agree that the benefit to Vandergrift will greatly outweigh the cost of membership, both by lowering expenses and by the sharing of services, knowledge, and programs on a more regional basis. This would in no way require that Vandergrift participate in any particular activity that the regional council supports, but it provides the opportunity to do so. In addition, to the Planning Commission presentation, prior to the meeting, each member of council will have a copy of the letter for membership that was prepared by the Intergovernmental Council, and a copy of the membership fees and how they are allocated among the members.

The Planning Commission has generously offered to attend our June meeting to give this short explanation and be open for questions. It is our hope that this will make it possible to make an informed decision about whether to join the Commission, and that a vote will follow.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I will need to attend another Council meeting at the same time on June 6th. Therefore, I am submitting this report in advance, in case anyone has any questions before the meeting. This report summarizes activities, projects, and work performed during the past month in addition to the preparation for and attendance of regular and scheduled meetings and also includes our requested agenda items:

2022 CDBG Street Reconstruction Project

The Preconstruction meeting was held at the Borough office May 6th with the County, Contractor and the Borough. Work is scheduled to start June 1st and be completed by June 3rd. Note that this project was specifically approved for early 2022 funding.

2021 CDBG Street Reconstruction Project - Sherman Ave., LaFayette Ave. & 7th Street

While Folino is in town, they plan to address this issue.

2021 Casino Theater and Library Building Improvement Project

Roofing Replacement

Fuller Roofing is scheduled to start roofing work June 6th. The contract amount for the roofing work is \$105,948.

Project 70 Timber Sale

Since no bids were received the first time, the timber sale was advertised a second time. One bid was received within the time specified which is to be opened and read aloud at the meeting. If acceptable, the bid may be awarded contingent upon review by the Forester, Dave O'Barto, or tabled for review, or rejected.

<u>Driveway Permits</u> No permits issued in May – 2 requests for driveway requirements: 411 Jackson & 818 Holland.

Olmsted Commons

In order for this project to proceed, we look forward to meeting with the organizations that are interested in, and/or have made financial contributions and commitments toward the Volunteer Efforts.

Joseph A. Petrarca Memorial Swimming Pool Rejuvenation Project - DCED Grant

Correspondence regarding the procedure to repair a tear in the liner without voiding the warranty.

Street Excavation Permits - Several repair permits issued for water and gas line leaks.

Columbia Avenue Street-Tree, Pervious Sidewalk and Parking Lot Rain Garden Project

We made a third Pa-1 Call and (finally) all the utilities have been marked and we have located the markings since they sometimes rapidly fade away.

Digital Designs

We responded to questions regarding the requirements to expand this Non-Conforming Use in a Residential Zoning District. Digital Designs will first need to request a Zoning Hearing with the ZHB for any expansion. Such request should also include any setback or other dimensional variances that they may need from the Zoning Hearing Board. This expansion may also require a Site Development and Stormwater Management Plan.

Sewer Issues

37th Street Drainage and Heave issue

The repairs were discussed at the May 2nd meeting. Note that some of the swale and grading work will be on private property and permission from the owners (Burke and Tvrdovski) will be needed.

Alabama Avenue Collapsed Storm Sewer

We discussed possible repair options and placed a Pa-1 Call for the utilities to be located and marked. The Borough plans to purchase the materials and solicit costs for Equipment and Operator to install the pipe and rock lining.

Proposed Sewer Connection - Homes in Allegheny Township along LaBelle Vue Road - No update.

Abandoned and/or Unsafe Buildings

906 Holland Street - The permit to demolish the structure has been issued.

Notice of Unsafe Structural Conditions

117½ (Rear) Longfellow Street – As of May 31st, we've received no response to the 2nd certified mail 30-day notice sent April 8th, nor has any action been taken on this property. Further actions may be required by the Borough to notify the owner before enforcement actions can be taken. We recommend seeking the solicitor's advice on how to proceed with enforcement actions for this property.

122 Franklin Avenue – The certified mail 30-day notice was received April 4th. As of May 31st, no action has been taken on this property. Therefore, we recommend that enforcement actions be taken.

Kennedy Street Preliminary Speed Hump Study

We began researching PennDOT Publications 383 & 46 for requirements and suitable Traffic Calming techniques. We started gathering the field data and photos. Speed Humps and Tables are considered unconventional traffic control devices and as such, should only be installed after careful consideration, engineering studies and public involvement. Items that need to be considered include but are not limited to: funding source; cost of construction of devices, signs and pavement markings; cost of on-going maintenance; effect on Emergency Vehicles and response times; effect on snow removal; effect on drainage; ADA requirements; legal issues; etc. The Study and Approval process, construction and maintenance will need to follow PennDOT guidelines to protect the Borough from claims that the devices caused or contributed to an accident, or were improperly installed or inadequately maintained.
