### STREET & SANITATION REPORT:

Chairperson Sciullo requested all residents to bag their leafs and place the bags out in front street. He stated that the Borough Crew will collected the bags on Fridays. He stated that the bags must be weighed and counted for the purpose of turning this information to DEP.

Mrs. Wilson stated that the 2020 CDBG Grant Application has been submitted to the County Planning Department. She stated that the number of streets on this project was reduced from Nineteen (19) to thirteen (13) due to the total cost of the project. He also stated that Grant Avenue and McKinley Avenue do not qualify as they do not benefit low or moderate income homes, being a commercial area.

Mrs. Wilson suggested that Council, in the Spring, submit a Multimodal Grant Application for the purpose of reconstructing Grant and McKinley Avenues. She stated that the application must be submitted by July 31, 2020.

Engineer Lucian Bove presented an invoice payment #2 from Nagy Construction in the amount of \$101,865.49 regarding the Oregon Avenue street reconstruction project. (See page 4-A)

A motion was made by Mr. Sciullo, second by Mr. Collini, to pay the aforementioned invoice in the amount of \$101,865.49. Motion carried with Mrs. Wilson abstaining.

Mr. Bove reported on the unsafe condition of the structure located at 127 Grant Avenue, known as Vi's Bar. He suggested that the Borough make application to the Westmoreland County Act 152 Demofund Program to have this structure razed. He stated that the application will require a title search.

A motion was made by Mr. Sciullo, second by Mr. Collini, to direct the Engineer to proceed with an application regarding the aforementioned matter. Motion carried.

Engineer Bove stated that he has approved a permit to create an off-street parking for Donghia Lumber Company. He stated that this will provide needed parking for their customers.

Mr. Bove stated that he will try to obtain new quotes for the sewer repair work on Whittier Street.

# Children are hurt by secondhand smoke!

Exposure to secondhand smoke has been estimated to result in at least 38,000 annual deaths in the United States and over one million illnesses in children (National Cancer Institute. Health Effects of Exposure to Environmental Tobacco Smoke: The Report of the California Environmental Protection Agency. Smoking and Tobacco Control Monograph no. 10. Bethesda, MD. U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, National Institutes of Health, National Cancer Institute, NIH Pub. No. 99-4645, 1999, <a href="http://cancercontrol.cancer.gov/tcrb/nci\_monographs/MONO10/MONO10.HTM">http://cancercontrol.cancer.gov/tcrb/nci\_monographs/MONO10/MONO10.HTM</a>.).

Secondhand smoke contains more than 250 chemicals known to be toxic or carcinogenic (cancer-causing), including formaldehyde, benzene, vinyl chloride, arsenic, ammonia, and hydrogen cyanide. The Environmental Protection Agency classifies secondhand smoke, as a class A carcinogen; a substance known to cause cancer in humans and many serious illnesses in children including asthma, respiratory infections and cardiovascular disease.

Children who are exposed to secondhand smoke are inhaling many of the same cancer-causing substances as smokers. There is no risk-free level of secondhand smoke exposure. Even brief exposures can be harmful. The only way to fully protect yourself and your loved ones from the dangers of secondhand smoke is through 100% smoke-free environments (The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke: A Report of the Surgeon General June 27, 2006).

# Children Imitate Adult Behaviors

How do children learn to walk? To talk? To play sports? From adults! Every year in Pennsylvania, nearly 17,300 children under the age of 18 will become new daily smokers (Campaign for Tobacco Free Kids, 2012). When children see adults smoking in family-friendly places such as parks and playgrounds, they see the behavior as acceptable. Parks are about clean air, natural beauty and engaging in healthy activities, smoking just doesn't fit in.


# Pennsylvanians Support Tobacco-Free Outdoor Areas

Most Pennsylvanians, about 77.6% (Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, 2011), **DO NOT** smoke. Tobacco-free policies that restrict tobacco use where children play help to protect the health of all community members.

Tobacco-free policies are public park policies similar to those prohibiting alcohol use or littering in public parks and are largely self-enforcing.

Posting adequate signage provides an opportunity to educate the community about the tobacco-free policy and allows individuals to handle tobacco use in the same manner as an alcohol or litter complaint that may occur at these facilities.

Help to prevent children's exposure to secondhand smoke at outdoor public play places. Supporting a tobacco-free ordinance in your city will make a difference in the health and welfare of all community members.

# **POLICY STATEMENT**

Borough of Vandergrift is committed to providing a healthful environment for youth and adults. Therefore, we believe that:

- 1. Tobacco/vape product use around children and youth is unhealthy and detrimental to their health.
- 2. Tobacco/vape products used in public spaces are often discarded on the ground, thus posing a risk of ingestion to toddlers and causing a litter problem.
- 3. As parents and adults, we are thought of as role models, and the use of tobacco products around youth has a negative effect on their lifestyle choices.

# **TOBACCO FREE AREA POLICY**

Borough of Vandergrift does not allow the use of tobacco/vaping products in play areas at any time.

# **COMPLIANCE PROCEDURES**

The emphasis on enforcing our Tobacco-Free policy is primarily through voluntary compliance:

- 1. Vandergrift Borough will post YLAP signs asking adults to refrain from using tobacco/ vape products in play areas.
- 2. Vandergrift Borough will notify activity organizations and/or leaders or coaches of the "No Tobacco/Vaping use" policy in Youth Play areas.
- 3. Vandergrift Borough staffers who observe tobacco/vaping use in Youth Play Areas will remind user of the tobacco/vape free policy.
