Dear Members of Council,

Once again it is time for the Vandergrift Improvement Program to request permission to use the streets of Vandergrift for the annual Artfest. For many years, Artfest has been a wonderful opportunity to engage the people and businesses of Vandergrift, and to welcome thousands of visitors to our streets.

This year, we would like to request permission for Artfest to be held on Saturday, July 25th. We would further like to ask permission to block Grant Avenue from Jefferson Street to Washington Avenue on this date. We would also ask permission to close Farragut Avenue between Grant and 11th Street, McKinley Avenue from Grant to 12th Street, and Columbia Avenue between 11th and 12th. These areas will need to be blocked beginning at 8 am, and until approximately 8 pm (one hour following the conclusion of the festival at 7 pm.) The hours of Artfest will be from 11 am to 7 pm.

We are especially excited about this year's theme, "Take Your Broken Heart, Turn it Into Art." We want to encourage artists to share their stories about how art has healed them. We will be inviting community organizations that provide healing services to have displays at Artfest, so that the community can become more aware of the variety of support organizations available for those who are struggling. The day will once again include fine art, crafters, food trucks, live music, and performances. In light of Vandergrift's 125th Anniversary, we want to make this an Artfest to remember.

We have a team of volunteers ready to get to work on this project, and will encourage many others from the community to be involved. We hope that you will grant us permission to hold this date and close the street as needed in order to carry out this great event for Vandergrift.

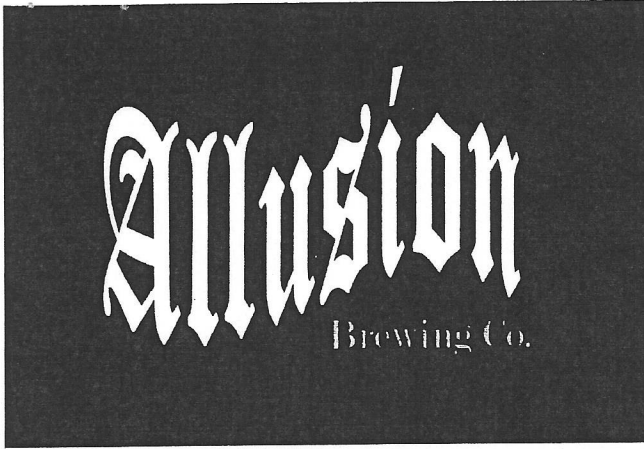

From all of us at Allusion Brewing Company, we would like to thank you for your past and ongoing support and assistance. For taking the time to consider this matter, we thank you again.

As part of our state licensure for brewing and serving at our location, we have to be able to serve food to our customers. The regulations for doing so are not difficult to meet. We can simply have a rack of chips/pretzels and meet the regulation. This option is used by several breweries in Southwestern Pennsylvania, however, our market research and social media inquiries have given us very strong feedback against this option. Brewery patrons want to see different food options offered when they go out to frequent the locations they love. Several of the residents of Vandergrift have asked in person that we not only have more food options for them, but also that we "please offer lunch."

We have nothing but positive things to say about the residents of Vandergrift and the overwhelming support we have received bringing our brewery to the town. Our mission statement is very inclusive of the community and we want to do everything we possibly can to benefit the town and bring more business to all of Vandergrift. We are working with Ianni's Pizzeria on a system to allow anyone in the brewery to order pizza delivered to the while they are at our location. We would welcome anyone bringing in food from G&Gs as well if they chose, as all of these options would also help us meet our state license requirement of having food options for our customers.

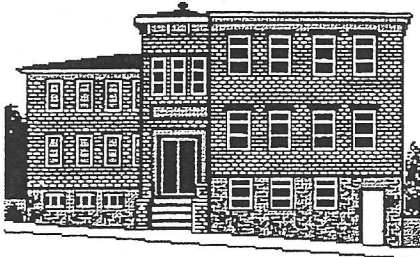
As we continue to renovate our building and strive to have our Grand Opening in the Spring of 2020, we are very quickly realizing we will not have the space we thought to prepare the menu options we had intended. For this reason, we are asking for permission from Vandergrift to establish a food truck rotation in front of our brewery on Grant Ave. We do not own a food truck, and there would not be a permanent vehicle in the space. We would establish and manage a food truck rotation in the timeframe you would allow us to do so. The food trucks we are in contact with have a very strong social media following and we believe combining our social media advertising with theirs, we can not only offer more food options to our town, but also very quickly start bringing more people into Vandergrift.

Our intentions for this request are 100% motivated by what we believe is best for the town. The food trucks do not bring any additional sales to our brewery, but would offer more food options and keep our craft beer lovers in house more often as they will have more variety offered to them. Several Vandergrift residents have even approached us asking if we would have food or a food truck rotation. Having increased food options is asked of us more often than even questions about our beer! We are asking this as much for us, as we are the residents of our town. We would welcome the feedback from the other restaurants in this matter. We believe that more food options will do nothing but help the town and all the businesses. As "more lunch options" are requested, please take that into consideration as we consider this matter further.

Thank you again for your attention in this manner. We look forward to working with you towards any solution that will benefit Vandergrift!

Dear Council Members:

The Vandergrift Museum and Historical Society is asking for permission to hold a car cruise (as we did for the last three years) on Friday, June 5 on Grant Avenue. Last year's cruise was a huge success. It helped show off our town and allowed us to make a few dollars to help to continue operating the Museum.

We would like to close Grant Avenue to traffic from Washington to Columbia Avenues starting at 4 pm on that day and run to approximately 10 pm. This is what we did last year and it seemed to go well. We are also requesting the use of Farragut Avenue and Sumner Avenue from Grant to 11th Avenue. These areas will be used if we run out of space on Grant Avenue for parking the cruise cars. We will make sure the police have access to their building.

We are requesting that street parking not be allowed after 4 p.m. on Friday, June 5th to accommodate the cars being displayed at the cruise. As was done last year, we will place no parking notices on cars throughout the week indicating that parking would not be allowed on Friday, June 5th after 4 p.m. until 10 p.m. on that day if approved by the Council.

Food will be sold as was done last year. A live band will also be set up on the corner of Grant and Farragut as was done last year. Port-a-johns will be available. We will also be contacting the local business owners and advising of this event if they wish to remain open.

Solicitor Loperfito stated that the County has indicated its plan to remove the funding due to a lack of cooperation from the heirs of said property. He recommended the filing a nuisance action with court in the event the Borough does not receive the demo funding.

A motion was made by Mr. Holmes, second by Mr. Collini, to authorize the Solicitor to file a nuisance action against the property at 129 Grant Avenue. Motion carried.

Mr. Bove questioned what action wishes to take regarding the owner of the property at 404 Whittier Street. He stated that the owner has failed to separate his sewer lateral line, which has been causing problems to the neighboring house.

A motion was made by Mr. Holmes, second by, to direct the Engineer to notify the owner of the aforementioned property to either make the sewer separation or face legal action. Motion carried.

Mr. Bove stated that the machine shop at 403 Jackson Avenue is incurring water seepage to the building. He stated that owner, during an attempt to eliminate this problem, discovered an abandoned gas or water line. He recommended the owner contact both utility companies.

A motion was made by Mr. Collini, second by Mr. Maszgay, direct the Engineer to notify the owner of said property to tie into the Borough's drainage system and provide a liability waiver. Motion carried. Motion carried.

Mr. Bove stated that the resident at 215 Bryant Street, Allegheny Twp., is requesting permission to provide a off-street driveway. He stated that this will be highly expensive due to the very steep bank, adversely affecting the Borough sewer line, and problems with the existing gas and water service lines.

Mr. Bove requested authorization to prepare construction plans, specs and required grant documents regarding the Olmstead Commons Project. He stated the Bove Engineering Company will be donating \$5,000 towards this project.

A motion was made by Mr. Uskuraitis, second by Mr. Maszgay, to approve the aforementioned authorization. Motion carried.

Mrs. Chvala stated that the three (3) Sycamore trees will be saved during this project. She also stated that Shelby Michalek, Marketing Director with the County Land Bank, will be at the March 2nd meeting to provide a presentation regarding the Olmstead Commons Project.

Mr. Bove announced at tentative start date for work at the No. Fire Department at the end of this week, at an estimated cost of \$3,000.

Mr. Uskuriatis recommended that this project be postponed until warmer weather due the fire apparatus cannot be left outside. He suggested that Mike Reilly, president of the fire company be notified.

A motion was made by Mr. Maszgay, second by Mr. Uskuaritis, to direct the Engineer to readdress the condition of the chimney at the structure located at 518 Hancock Avenue. Motion carried with Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. McClarnon abstaining.

Solicitor Loperfито recommended that permission is obtained from the property owner, and that the Engineer have the Code Officer with him.

STREET & SANITATION REPORT:

Chairperson Holmes presented and read letter from Officer Joe Gray regarding the Department's efforts to provide Christmas dinners and gifts to the needy families. (See page 5-A)

Mr. Holmes stated that there is a need for substitute school crossing guards. He stated that in the absence of a guard, it is filled by a police officer. He explained that a problem exists when the officer is forced to leave due an emergency call.

Mr. Uskuriatis suggested placing this matter on the Borough's website.

A motion was made by Mr. Collini, second by Mr. Uskuraitis, to accept the Police & Public Safety Report. Motion carried.

Once again it has been a blessed Christmas season. The Vandergrift Police Department was able to provide four families with Christmas dinners and Christmas gifts under the tree for some very deserving children.

In addition to the Adopt-a-family program the police department along with the help of Kiski Area East Primary Principle Marchand were able to give the school 500 pairs of new socks in Kiski colors for students.

On December 22nd a donor came into the police station with a monetary gift and it was explained that the gifts and meals had already been bought and given away, and there was no need for the money at this time. The generous donor still insisted on giving the money for helping the community in the future. December 23rd Officers were dispatched to the area of the railroad tracks in East Vandergrift, where officers found a young man from out of state walking along the tracks, waiting on relatives from Texas to come to Pennsylvania to pick him up the next day, Christmas Eve. Officers tried repeatedly to reach out to different groups to get a meal and a place for the young man to stay for the night with negative results. In addition to being hungry and not having a place to stay. The Males shoes were falling off of his feet due to poor condition. One of the officers on scene made a call and was able to gain access to the money that had been given the day before by the generous donor. The Officer then made arrangements with a local motel to put him up for the night and also provided him a meal. The officer then went to the Dollar General and bought him a pair of boots so he would have something decent to walk in.



I acknowledge that I have a conflict regarding matters that would financially impact Bove Engineering and cannot participate and must comply with the disclosure requirements of Section 1103(j) of the State Ethics Act. I acknowledge that my conflict in this matter, includes making motions and voting, and also includes actions such as lobbying other members, speaking as to motions or advocating for a certain result.

I do hereby execute this document in accordance with the requirements of the Pennsylvania State Ethics Commission disclosure requirements and apply the same to all actions, on behalf of Bove Engineering which may arise before the Council of the Borough of Vandergrift as of the date, time and meeting identified in the minutes of the Borough meeting.
